MEMBER PROFILE: LOIS COLEMAN Bringing Us Together By Alynne Wesson



If the Genius Bar is where you go to get help with your Apple device, then Lois Coleman is the one-woman genius bar for many individuals and committees at All Souls. But she doesn't just troubleshoot. Lois, who has a very sunny presence, fosters connection, in the best sense of the digital term "web." She is the tech "genius" and teacher behind numerous online endeavors that help bring people together at All Souls. She has helped church members learn how

to use the All Souls Connext Mighty Network, and has set up websites for the very popular Buddhism and Mindfulness group run by Director of Pastoral Ministries Pamela Patton (allsoulsnycbuddhism.org), the All Souls Historical Society (allsoulsnychistory.org), and the Bicentennial Committee. She has served the last two groups in multiple capacities, because, she says, "the history of All Souls is fascinating to me." She has just joined the team undertaking a revamping the church's own website.

"Lucky me," says Pamela, who is also a WA member. "Lois volunteered to create the website for Buddhism & Mindfulness at All Souls. I can't imagine a more easy and earnest collaborator than Lois. She approaches a project with expertise but no conceit. She is a true partner in brainstorming. She kept the project moving quickly, and she kept me focused (meanwhile she was the one doing me a huge favor). Lois is as generous as she is talented, and our community is much the better for it."

For all Lois has done at All Souls, it is hard to believe she only joined in 2009. Monday Night Hospitality was an introduction to volunteerism at the church, and she served as a Lay Pastoral Associate for five years. There, she "found that she learned at least as much as she was able to give by offering compassion and a listening ear to others in the community."

Lois' work-in-progress also includes working on a committee setting up All Souls' accreditation with the UUA's "Green Sanctuary" program, which promotes climate justice. It aims, in part, to push the church toward becoming, from an environmental perspective, more involved with local, underprivileged communities.

The tech work and her efforts to foster connection at All Souls are natural steps for Lois. Between 1999 and her retirement in 2019, she was a research and instructional services librarian and, until 2010, the "webmaster" for the Barnard Library at Barnard College in Manhattan. She had taught herself HTML. Before obtaining her Master's in Library Science in the 1990s, she taught junior high school mathematics (not "math") in Manhattan, and before that she taught high school mathematics and A-level psychology in her native England.

Women's Alliance members and others at All Souls have received instruction from Lois about the digital tools available to them, and she chuckles when asked if teaching young people or mature adults is more challenging. "Adults are much harder to teach — you have to take into account all their life experience and that they are not used to sitting and receiving instruction!"

Lois grew up the daughter of a Methodist minister father and a physics teacher mother. "I could say

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they were very devout, but they didn't talk about religion. Something very English about that." During her young adulthood she questioned religion and "realized I was not a Christian." After she moved to New York City to join her American husband in the early 1980s, she became involved with Unitarianism, first at Community Church and then at the Fourth Universalist Society, where she served on the board and then as president of the congregation from 2007 to 2008.

During this time Lois was a divorced working mother living on the Upper West Side. While her daughter is now grown and lives in her own apartment there, Lois happily made the move to Riverdale with her partner Harry Miller, a Dharma teacher who is involved with the All Souls Buddhism and Mindfulness program. They met in 2014, she cheerfully reports, on Match, where his profile made an excellent first impression due, in part, to his stated interest in Buddhism and his warm eyes. Last year Lois joined the Women's Alliance to meet more All Souls women, have interesting conversations and go on outings with friends."

Happy Spring Humanists!

A number of years ago I began giving sanctuary tours with WA member Mary-Ella Holst. And one quickly realizes there aren't ANY memorials to women in our sanctuary, not so much as a plaque or an embroidered pillow. Yet, women have played an outsized role at All Souls. In fact, I think we could say our church was founded by a woman.

All Souls was the first Unitarian congregation to be organized in New York City when Lucy Channing Russel (1787-1863) invited about 40 friends and neighbors into her lower Manhattan home in 1819 to listen to an address by her brother, the Unitarian theologian and minister William Ellery Channing. Their enthusiasm culminated in the formation of this congregation, which proceeded to erect its first building in 1820-21, before it had even found a minister.

As it happens, there's a large plaque honoring William Ellery Channing and also one for that first minister, William Ware.

THE POWER OF NARRATIVE Nikkole Salter delivered the 2022 Angie Utt Lecture By Marilynn Scott Murphy

On Saturday, February 12, the WA's annual Angie Utt Lecture about women in American culture was honored by the presence of Nikkole Salter, the new Chair of the Department of Theatre Arts at Howard University. She defined herself as a storyteller, and her talk ranged from the power of narrative to theater as activism to her goal to "make a cultural contribution to the future" though working with young people. During the spirited Q&A that followed, she addressed topics as large as anti-racism and the acceleration of change between generations, and as particular as her learning curve in her new job.



Nikkole is currently an administrator who has worked as a professional actress, an OBIE Award-winning and Pulitzer Prize-nominated playwright, and a teacher. As an advocate, Nikkole has served on the boards of many prominent organizations, including, currently, the Council of The Dramatists Guild, where she serves as Chair of the Board of the Theatre Communications Group; and The Continuum Project, Inc., a 501(c)(3) non-

From April 8 to May 8 you can see Nikkole live onstage at The Huntington Calderwood/BCA in Boston. She will be acting in "Our Daughters, Like Pillars," a world premiere. AND ... at Ford's Theatre in Washington, D.C., from March 19 to May 14, you can see the musical "Grace," for which she co-authored the book with Nolan Williams, Jr., who wrote the music and lyrics.
