Katz's primary subject matters are his surroundings in downtown New York City and coastal Maine, and they include an evolving community of poets, artists, dancers and filmmakers who have animated the cultural avantgarde from the postwar period to the present. To celebrate the 20th anniversary of its founding, Neue Galerie presents selections from Lauder's collection, one of the finest art collections in the world. Approximately 500 works, many of them on display for the first time, include masterworks of Greek and Roman sculpture, Italian 13th and 14th-century gold-ground paintings, objects for a Kunstkammer, and Austrian and German painting, sculpture and decorative arts from the early 20th century. decided to show these new pieces with the same furniture from the rooms of my home where they are normally displayed," says Lauder. "In essence, I am opening my private world for the public to see so it can understand the world of the private collector." WA MEMBER PROFILE JOAN FLESCH High Notes and Hard Serves

Last month at our WA holiday party, Joan Flesch was resplendent in seasonal red — from her elegant sweater to the festive earrings that she hand-crafted with Venetian

blown glass. Between catching up with old friends and welcoming new ones, she was also quietly busy with the party's organizing team. But from now through March, Joan is busy outdoors on the tennis courts of sunny Florida, as she is every winter. A veteran of high school and college tennis teams, she plays the sport indoors in Manhattan in the fall and spring, and then outdoors again in the summer near her home in the Berkshires, where some of her competitors are her Florida tennis friends. She is grateful that she has been able to play her "socially-distanced sport" throughout the pandemic.

In December, she was happy to report another physical, if not so socially-distanced activity: trimming the tree with her stepdaughter and step-granddaughters Harper (13) and Stella (11), who live in Brooklyn. Later, they shared a delightful Christmas Day.

For all her seasonal relocating, Joan remains a New Yorker through and through. She grew up in Scarsdale, attended NYU's uptown campus, and has lived in "The City" ever since, along the way earning an MLS at Columbia University and an MBA at NYU Stern. She has been active in the Women's Alliance since around 2001, when she retired from Unilever, where she served as director for marketing research and then manager for competitive intelligence; she has been active at All Souls since 1986, when a friend suggested she check it out.

Joan brought the important work of Women for Afghan Women to the attention of the Alliance, organizing a presentation by representatives of WAW's New York Community Center for our October membership meeting, and she has served at many WA holiday events. Her wide-ranging service at All Souls has included, among other things, chairing the audit committee and ushering at Sunday services. For years she mentored two students through the church's Adopt-a-School Program at the low-performing elementary school P.S. 50, and she still gets together with one of them, Ashley, who is now 28 and employed full-time by New York City's Administration for Children's Services. Joan also takes part in some of All Souls' 10 a.m. weekday programs on Zoom.

Outside of the church, Joan's volunteer work extends to the New-York Historical Society and, during the summer, to the Tanglewood Music Festival near her summer home in North Egremont, Mass. Music, especially opera, is a passion that has drawn her to the Bayreuth Festival in Bavaria, La Scala in Milan, the Glimmerglass Festival in Cooperstown, and the Seattle Opera. In New York City she frequents the Metropolitan Opera for performances and panel discussions, and is a member of the Wagner Society of New York. The performances of Musica Viva NY are a special bonus.

For years she has expressed her own creative impulses with jewelry design, handcrafting beautiful works with crochet, beading and blown glass, and taking part in juried shows.

THE WARE ROOM A Peek at the Past and the Future

The Ware Room was the longtime home to monthly membership meetings and other events of the Women's Alliance. But aside from a few gatherings of the Bridge SIG, we have not met there since before the pandemic. Now our return is further delayed, in part, by ongoing renovation work in the Wiggin parish house, where the Ware Room is located. The renovation was commissioned by All Souls School, which leases space from the church and has the Ware Room for its own use, generally during the day on weekdays.

When the Ware Room does reopen later this winter, we can expect to see a lot of changes as well as a nod to history. Wiggin was built in the early 1950s, and during recent demolition work, the school's contractor discovered old wallpaper that is pictured here in a snapshot by Dr. Jennifer Vest, director of All Souls School. Jennifer was inspired by this bit of uncovered church history to carry it forward. New wallpaper on the south wall of the Ware Room will be inspired by the old.

The WA's own Deborah Taylor, a retired architect who specializes in buildings energy policy, is a member of the Building Advisory Task Force of the Unitarian Church of All Souls. She has been our representative regarding the Wiggin renovations (she has recently been joined by Howard Turner) and she served as one of the three members of the task force when it was involved with the major renovations that were recently completed in our sanctuary.
