Happy New Year! Welcome to 2024!

Thanks to the many members who helped make the Sunday, December 3rd return of our traditional Women's Alliance Holiday Gift Sale and Raffle a success and fun event for the All Souls community. The previous Holiday Gift Sale and Raffle was in 2018. In 2019 we only had the Raffle due to construction at All Souls. We've had



no fundraising events since then. In December the event returned to Reidy Friendship Hall and began at its usual time just after the Sunday service. We were able to sell gift items left over from 2018 and had 3 tables for jewelry, 2 tables for fashion and 2 tables for housewares. We also had a very popular Bake Sale with the table strategically placed by the doorway into Reidy Friendship Hall for churchgoers coming down the stairs from the sanctuary. The sale and raffle netted about \$1,600, which will support the Women's Alliance donations to charities. 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

MEMBER PROFILE: RACHEL ZIEMBA By Alynne Wesson



A couple years ago Rachel Ziemba made history, of sorts, at All Souls when she struck a blow for diversity and inclusion by joining the church's wine tasting group, The Cork Dorks. But Rachel, who is studying to be a sommelier, agreed to crash the all-male precinct on one condition: that other women be recruited to follow in her footsteps.

"I broke the gender line," she smiles, adding that several Women's Alliance members have, in fact, raised glasses with her as members of the Cork Dorks. Together with Tara McNamara, her sister member of the Cork Dorks, the WA, and the Heart & Soul Charitable Fund Board of Directors, she has also hosted fundraising wine tastings to support Heart & Soul. Several WA members have attended, and she's grateful for the support.

An expert in global economic and political risk, especially as it pertains to the energy sector, Rachel now runs her own firm, Ziemba Insights. In some ways, she comes by her bent towards economics and her love of wine naturally. Her father, William Ziemba, was a noted scholar of quantitative finance, risk control and management science who taught at the University of British Columbia. And he was a wine lover. Her mother Sandra, an artist, is also an economist who, reports her admiring daughter, "taught early classes on what we now call ESG and corporate social responsibility."

Rachel grew up Unitarian in Vancouver, British Columbia, even participating in Coming of Age and teaching church school. She moved to New York in 2006 after attending the University of Chicago, receiving a master's degree in international relations at the University of Oxford, and stints working in Egypt and Canada's capital, Ottawa.

She joined All Souls in 2007, became a member of the Young Adults, relocated to London for several years, but saw All Souls as a touchpoint for her intermittent New York visits. When she returned to All Souls in 2015, she threw herself into volunteering. She ushers for the Sunday service, serves on the board of Heart & Soul and runs its website, and serves on the All Souls Finance Committee, where she advises the board on budget matters. She is also beginning her tenure on the Women's Alliance Finance Committee and is a newly tapped All Souls deacon.

"For a while I resisted the WA," she admits, noting that the group did not seem to include young people and that many of its meetings are scheduled on weekdays. Then she got a little older, her schedule became a little more flexible, and she was persuaded to join the WA by the late Betty McCollum. "I realized," she says, "how much the Alliance does in the church community and beyond, and I wanted to support and be a part of that."

In a marriage of her professional life (you may have seen her on CNBC sharing her insights about energy and critical mineral markets and sanctions policies) and her passion as a wine connoisseur, Rachel recently launched a Substack column, "Journeys in Wine Economics." Those journeys have taken her from the wine scene in her native British Columbia to Spain's most important wine regions, to the wine country of South Africa outside Cape Town. "I'll be thinking about wine and climate change," she writes, "trade issues and just sharing some cool-to-me stories of wine regions."

CHARITABLE GIFTS FROM THE WOMEN'S ALLIANCE

With gratitude to those who submitted recommendations for recipients of our charitable funds, the WA's Finance Committee presents the names of the nonprofits chosen to receive gifts in 2023. Checks were disbursed in December.

The committee received recommendations of six new organizations and three organizations to which we donate both currently and in years past. The committee first evaluated the new organizations against the criteria specified in our Charitable Giving Policy to determine eligibility and then researched those that qualified with Charity Navigator and GuideStar data and 990 filings.

As the WA continues to prioritize organizations to which we have donated previously, the committee also reviewed the current donees to make sure they still qualified. All recipients were approved by the Executive Board.

• The International Convocation of Unitarian Universalist Women (ICUUW) is a nonprofit organization in special consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), focusing on global women's rights and empowerment.

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- The Brigid Alliance is a nationwide practical support organization that arranges and funds transportation and other logistical support for individuals who must travel long distances for abortion care.
- The New Amsterdam Boys & Girls Choir annually gives 10-15 New York City performances, and
 has performed in other states as well as in Canada. The choir's membership comes from East
 Harlem's public schools, and most members come without any musical training.
- Gotham Food Pantry is not only a notable organization, but this gift is also in memory of George Collins, a founding member of the organization. It was founded in the summer of 2020 to address soaring food insecurity brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic.
